Record Consumer Profile: WCI Survey Summarized

The Warner Communications Inc. "Prefecorded Music Market" survey is one of the most extensive studies of the record and tape-buying audience ever conducted in the industry. Its conclusions contradict several record industry notions, including the longstanding belief that the chief record buying audience is the 15-25 age group.

R&R presented a brief summary of highlights from the WCI survey in March. WCI has now published a booklet outlining all but the most confidential findings from their research eftorts. Following is a more detailed look at the survey results.

Data Process

Recapitulating the basics of the survey's methodology, WCI used a sample of 3385, stratified geographically and then divided into 12 age "cells," with sex and race also considered. Face-to-face interviews were conducted in April-May 1977, with about 200 pieces of information gathered in questionaire form. Dr. Martin Fishbein, Professor of Psychology and Research Professor at the Institute of Communications Research, University of Illinois, and Warner Special Products President Michael Kapp conceived and devised the survey effort.

Population Extrapolation

With the idea of getting a line on the future, the survey begins with a U.S. Census Bureau comparison of present population divided into fiveyear age groups and projection of 1985 population figures. As can be seen on page 12, teen numbers are dropping, while the next group up, 20-24, should attain only minor gains (interestingly, a 24 percent increase in the "Under 5" group is predicted, another projection of a forthcoming baby boom). However, the three sections ranging from 25 to 44 should all gain significantly (along with the 60-plus group).

Combining figures, the 10-24 age group should show a decline of 8.9 percent by mid-1985, while the 25-44 bracket should be up 25.6 percent. Whereas now the two groups are almost equal in population total, by 1985 the older group should have a 10 million-plus edge on teens and young adults. However, the 25-44 group will lead the 45-plus sector by only about two million.

Record Growth

Radio programmers may draw their own conclusions from these estimates (many already have). Fortunately for the record industry, the dominating (Continued on page 12).

WWRL/New York Drops Numbered Playlist As Trend Gains Momentum

WWRL/New York is the latest Black-formatted radio station to drop a numbered playlist. Program Director Sonny Taylor indicated that the station's recent concentration on "passive dialogue research" (on-the-street interviews on music conducted by WWRL) was a significant factor in the decision.

Taylor told R&R: "Now that WWRL is conducting passive dialogue research, certain records have to get certain rotations. With numbers, you have to chart according to sales, and sometimes listener preference does not correlate with sales in a market. With categories of records listed alphabetically, it's easier to pull a record when it's showing strong negative reaction. It hasn't lost a number, it's just removed."

Taylor admits that his new alphabetical list will cause some difficulties for stores. "This theory will cause stores to do a little bit more homework and make more of a careful selection when ordering their records," he said. It will affect the pattern of reordering a record. Whereas in the past most stores would just buy off the numbers, this move will cause them to listen to the radio more to be aware of the music they're selling." Taylor is planning to talk with stores most affected by the no-number playlist. particularly small "momand-pop" operations.

According to Taylor, Keith Adams

at KDIA/Oakland (like WWRL part of the Sonderling chain) was first to drop the number playlist. WBLS/ New York, utilizing a more experimental Black music-dominated format, has also used a no-number playlist for some time.

WZUU Towers Topple; Station Off Air Two Days

WZUU/Milwaukee's two transmitter towers fell early Saturday morning (5-13), forcing the station off the air until the following Monday morning. Cause of the accident was still undetermined.

WZUU Program Director Chris Curtis told R&R that "turbulent weather" conditions prevailed at the time of the crash, with winds clocked at 60mph. The 650-ft. larger tower "fell across the guywire of the second tower, pulling it down, too. Both towers fell across the very heavily-travelled artery Capitol Drive. The larger tower fell across four lanes and onto an entrance ramp." Traffic was detoured around the area of the fall for nine hours.

The station was off the air from the towers' fall at 6:56am Saturday until 5am Monday. A team of station engineers, other technical personnel from WZUU's owners, Malrite Broadcasting, and staff from the company which erected the towers in September 1977 worked "around the clock," according to Curitis, to restore the station to the air. Polydor Country Roster Absorbed By Mercury

Country artists now on Polydor Records will be shifted to Phonogram's Mercury label in a move designed to simplify and streamline the Polygram Group's Country efforts. Mercury's long history as a Country label was cited by company officials as a strong reason for the move, and the concentration on one label was viewed as a constructive step.

Four staffers at Polydor's Nashville office are affected by the move. including National Country Promotion Director Jack Pride and A&R Director Jim Viennau, who may still produce some of Polydor's former artists on an independent basis. At Mercury, Frank Leffel continues as National Director of Country Promotion along with Assistant National Director Doyle McCollum. Dave Smith has been promoted to Midwest Regional Promotion Manager in a concurrent move with the Polydor shift.

Artists involved in the transfer include Johnny Russell, Lois Johnson, Rayburn Anthony. Mel Street, and Billy Thunderkloud. Some restructuring of the Polydor roster is viewed as possible when the absorption process is completed. the towers was undamaged, and was reconstructed; meanwhile, the station's General Manager "drove to Evanston Illinois to pick up an antenna that was tuned for us," Curtis relates.

Curtis described the damage as looking as if "a train had derailed. I've never seen anything like it." He said that power lines in nearby Whitefish Bay and Glendale were out, along with some phone lines. "If it had fallen on a Monday or Friday morning," Curtis added," "someone would have more than likely been killed." The early Saturday morning fall caused no injuries. Curtis had no explanation for the towers' fall, aside from the 60mph winds, but mentioned that "the towers were supposed to withstand winds of 118 mph."

Arbitron Radio Advisory Council Holds 1st Meeting




Arbitron's new Radio Advisory Council recently held its first meeting, designed to set ground rules for the group, which will act as a "communication arm" for broadcasters. Concerned radio questioners may direct inquiries and issues to their format representatives on the Council for subsequent examination by Arbitron.

The first meeting discussed items of radio interest, including Arbitron's Expanded Sample Frame (ESF), diary accuracy, response rates, radio station slogans, and others. Council Chairman Don Nelson (General Manager of WIRE/ Indianapolis) stated, "If that first meeting is an indication of future sessions, we expect that the radio industry will benefit from these efforts."

Widespread Retail Rumblings Apparent

Retailers' resentment across the country to recent rises in prices to stores and distributors has resulted in vocal protests, de-emphasis of displays for certain labels, and even unofficial boycotts in some areas:

CBS Records has been experiencing some difficulties with several New England retailers over price adjustments stemming from the move to a \$7.98 list price. While most retailers in the area are carrying CBS products, displays and in-store play have been curtailed in many cases.

In the Northwest, Portland-based Everybody's Records has been tangling with a number of labels on the issue of whether the store or

the manufacturer should pay shipping costs on defective records.

Perhaps more significantly, California record chains Tower, Music Plus, the Wherehouse and others have been refusing in varying degrees to buy product distributed by MS Distributors (including Arista, Chrysalis, Mushroom, and other independent labels) in what has been widely described as a boycott. The move resulted from MS passing along price increases from those labels to the retailers. MS General Manager Art Miller told R&R, "This is our business. We have to pay for these goods and get paid. We're in a bind." He stated that the situation for MS was "not as damaging as one would imagine,", adding that retail reports on MS-distribut-

ed records were largely unaffected; but he admitted that a problem did exist. A spokesman for the Tower chain confirmed that Tower was 'not buying'' MS lines, adding that singles were still being purchased. Miller also stated that singles sales were unaffected, and expressed confidence that "most of the fire will be out" within a week. But retailers in general seemed more inclined to institute active protests against record price hikes on a national scale.

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Harrison Exits R&R; Launches Goodphone Comm.

Radio & Records Managing Editor Mike Harrison has announced his resignation from his post at the newspaper to form Goodphone Communications, Inc. According to Harrison, the L.A.-based Goodphone will be a multimedia service organization encompassing a variety of media-related activities, including radio, television, and motion picture consultation. Goodphone will also publish a newsletter-type publication for media people. In addition, Harrison will write occasional guest columns and articles for R&R.

Harrison stated, "Of course, I leave R&R with mixed emotions ... over the four years in which I've been directly associated with the publication we have seen the crystallization of some of our industry's most dynamic and far-reaching innovations, including the birth and projection of AOR. Not being in daily contact with the newspaper's exceptional brain-bank of editorial people is a luxury I'll miss. I'm eager to begin my new project. The future of radio, music, and media in general looks exciting for us all." Radio & Records Editor/Publisher Bob Wilson commented: "Michael's creative contributions to R&R are too numerous to identify individually. All of us at R&R will miss him. He's an extremely creative and energetic talent who will continue to contribute to our industry on a greater level through his newly-formed company. We all wish him the best."

Harrison's resignation becomes effective 5/26. He can be reached at R&R until then.

Industry "Watchdog" For The "Little Guy" Formed In Philadelphia

A "watchdog" organization called the Recording Industry Competitive Trade Foundation has been established in Philadelphia by attorney Dennis Eisman. Its intent, according to Eisman, is to "protect the little guys in the recording industry who are at the mercy of the big conglomerates who are taking control." An introductory advertisement states that "a select panel of experts will constantly monitor the recording industry for abuses which adversely affect member wholesalers, distributors, rack jobbers, one-stops, retailers, and ultimately, the consumer." Confidential inquiries into incidents of "price fixing, illegal credit practices, acquisitions and mergers, promotional techniques, boycotts, kickbacks, discrimination, refusals to deal, corrupt practices, conspi-

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Massive Staff Shakeup At UA As New Regime **Takes Over**

A large number of United Artists Records employees were dismissed in initial reorganization moves by the new administration led by Artie Mogull and Jerry Rubinstein. Although the reorganization had not yet been completed by the end of this week, estimates of dismissals ranged up to 140 of a staff totalling about 220. Among those leaving were Vice President of Marketing Gordon Bossin, virtually the entire publicity staff, a number of A&R personnel, and various staffers in other departments. A&R chief Pat Pipolo will reportedly become Vice President of the International division, with certain other interdepartmental tranfers scheduled to take place. A long-anticipated roster reshuffle involving the dropping of a number of acts is also viewed as imminent as UA adjusts to a new regime, distribution by Capitol in the U.S. (R&R 5-12), and other factors of change.

racy" and many more abuses are promised for members, and the foundation promises to "take whatever action is deemed necessary to remedy the above-listed abuses. including furnishing evidence of illegal practices to government agencies.

Eisman emphasized to R&R, however, that "the first step is to work it out between the parties involved." He expressed hopes that the foundation could "educate" large companies in regard to certain abuses, but said that if necessary they would "take it to the limit" to correct such abuses. A panel of lawyers has agreed to accept cases centering on some of the abuses listed in the foundation's ad, according to Eisman.

Eisman became interested in the record industry via his involve-ment with an antitrust action against Warner Communications Inc. on behalf of Scorpio Music of Pennsylvania. He describes the industry as a "tremendously creative business, but it's out of the hands of the creative people. In any growing business," he said, "the corporate, conglomerate vultures get involved. For them, the bottom line is all that counts." He compares the record industry today to the petroleum industry in the late 19th century, when big oil concerns went about "forcing the little guy out of business." According to Eisman, "nine or ten" companies control 90 percent of the business today.

The foundation is designed as a non-profit organization supported by membership dues and contributions. "If we get a wide industry participation," Eisman told R&R, we'll be able to run an efficient organization." Atlantic Buys Big Tree; Morris Heads New **Atco/Custom Division**

Atlantic Records agreed in principle last week to purchase Big Tree Records, and has established a new record division, Atco Records & Custom Labels, with Big Tree principal and President Doug Morris named as President of the division. Big Tree's other principal, Vice President Dick Vanderbilt, will become President of Big Tree.

Morris' responsibilities with the Atco/Custom division will include coordinating the activities of At-lantic's affiliated labels (including Big Tree, Westbound, Led Zeppelin's Swan Song label and the Rolling Stones label), as well as generating new activity for the relatively dormant Atco label. Several Big Tree staffers, including West Coast General Manager Mardi Nehrbass and National Promotion Director

Public complaints to the FCC's Broadcast Bureau were up about 22 percent in March, with 4067 complaints received compared to 3347 in February. Other comments and inquiries were up 16 percent to 3244

Gannett, Combined Heads Thrilled About Merger

In the wake of Gannett Co. and Combined Communications' announced merger (R/R 5-12), chief executives of both companies expressed great enthusiasm about future prospects for the new operation. Gannett President Allen H. Neuharth described the merger as a "marriage made in heaven" before an audience of security analysts. Combined President Karl Eller termed it the "superdeal of all time " Gannett indicated that further expansion in the newspaper sphere (the company owns 77 papers at present) was likely, and that continued growth was expected. Neuharth stated his belief that no "serious regulatory problems" were anticipated and that "there aren't any antitrust problems " Those comments came following a Justice Department announcement that its Antitrust Division would look into the proposed Gannett-Combined merger.

Active FCC, FTC To Cause "Difficult Times" For Broadcasters, CBS Lobbyist Predicts

CBS's top Washington lobbyist told the network's affiliates that a new spirit of activism at the FTC and especially the FCC will result in "extremely difficult times" for broadcasters soon. CBS's Bill Leonard expressed his belief that the FCC, under new Chairman Charles Ferris, feels that broadcasters have had things their way for too long. He predicted that the Commission's replacement for outgoing Commissioner Margita White will be more of an activist, with views closer to Ferris'.

Leonard also predicted that the FTC would push the issue of children's TV advertising relentlessly but was fairly optimistic on the subject of the forthcoming rewritten Communications Act, forecasting that it would call for near-total deregulation of radio, along with elimination of the Fairness Doctrine for radio and a lengthening of the licensing period for radio and possibly TV.

Nixon Memoirs Beset By Boycott Ads, Sluggish Sales

Former President Richard M. Nixon's new book, "RN: The Memoirs Of Richard Nixon," is encountering its share of troubles in the early stages of its release. A campaign including ads in the Boston Globe and Washington Star along with bumper stickers, posters, and T-shirts has been launched with the theme "Don't Buy Books By Crooks." Many booksellers, even in prime former Nixon political stronghold areas, were reported unenthusiastic about the book's chances with considerable worry about the steep \$19.95 price tag. And early Los Angeles reports after the book went on sale indicated a slow turnover, along with occasional incidents of violence expressed by customers aiming kicks at displays of the Nixon book.

Sonderling First Quarter Net Up Sharply; Optimism Prevails

Sonderling Broadcasting Corp. reported first quarter net income was up 78 percent over the same period last year. Chairman Egmont Sonderling told the company's annual meeting that "prospects were good" for continued strong performance for the rest of the year. All of Sonderling's divisions, including radio, radio sales, advertising services, motion picture theaters, and the company's one TV station, experienced increased profits.

Drake/Chenault Stations Voting For All Time Top 10

Over 50 Drake-Chenault contemporary stations are voting to determine the ten "best records of all time." for inclusion in a National Hall of Fame. The stations are soliciting votes from their listeners, and after final results are tabulated, a day-long special featuring a countdown of the top ten will be assembled and readied for airing on Drake-Chenault-consulted stations on July 4.

Pat Boone's Pimples Choice Backfires

Pat Boone's TV spots on behalf of Acne-Statin skin blemish treatment have backfired as a result of a formal FTC complaint and injunction against the product's manufacturer. Boone and daughter Debby had appeared on the spots, proclaiming Acne-Statin's efficiency in acne cases; but the FTC found evidence that the product's claims were not totally substantiated.

In an unusual move (unique, according to FTC records), Boone announced that he would pay part of any fine or refund ordered against Acne-Statin following the FTC action. He indicated that he was "shocked and dismayed" that some Acne-Statin claims had not been verified scientifically, stating that his daughters had used the product with beneficial results. Boone is reportedly the first celebrity to assume responsibility for an endorsed product running afoul of FTC regulations, and an FTC representative hailed Boone's announcement as an example for other celebrity endorsers.

Sole Agency Liability Challenged Again By CBS

CBS Inc. is once again challenging the doctrine of agency sole liability via three 1976 media payment lawsuits now being actively pursued. The sole liability issue concerns whether ad agencies are solely liable for debts incurred, or whether financial responsibility can be shifted to the agency's clients in cases of bankruptcy. Earlier this year, a CBS-Stokely Van Camp court battle resulting from the bankruptcy of the defunct Lennen & Newell agency ended in a Stokely "nuisance settlement" of \$50,000, following a Federal District Court ruling against CBS (which had originally sought to recoup \$400,000 the company contended was owed for airtime wages) and supporting the sole liability concept. CBS is now pursuing a suit against Reynolds Metals Co. seeking to recoup \$188,000 in another Lennen & Newell case, along with suits against John Morrell & Co. and Sterling Drug seeking to regain smaller amounts. All three suits were originally filed in 1976, along with two other suits against McCormick & Co. and Best Foods which were settled out of court.

Attorney Proposes Free Public Interest TV Licenses

Stanley Fleishman, an attorney who has testified before the House Communications Subcommittee (in charge of rewriting the Communications Act), has proposed a system of TV licensin which would provide certain licenses free of charge to licensees broadcasting in the public interest. The proposal would have the government reserve one or two TV channels in a market for public TV; while other channels would be leased for three-year periods free of government control except in technical matters. The licenses would be free, but a "fair rent" would be charged to finance quality programs for public television, placing the burden of supporting public TV on commercial broadcasters but reducing government censorship activities, according to Fleishman.

"Roots" Segment Tops All-Time TV Top 50

The concluding segment of ABC's "Roots" miniseries was the most-watched TV program in history, according to a Datly Variety survey of the all-time TV Top 50 based on Nielsen figures. ABC placed 23 programs on the list, compared to NBC's 15 and CBS' 12. All eight episodes of "Roots" placed in the top 16. The remainder of the top 10 featured Super Bowl XII (last year's) in second place, followed by 3) "Gone With The Wind" Part I 4) the same film's second-part showing 5) "Roots" Part VI 6) "Roots" Part V 7) "Roots" Part III 8) Super Bowl XI 9) "Roots" Part II and 10) "Roots" Part IV. Other top-rated movies include "Godiather" Part IV at 13 and "Airport" at 17, while five other Super Bowl telecasts placed in the top half of the fifty most popular shows. The highest-ranking regular series episode was a January 1978 "Laverne & Shirley" segment tied for 22nd place. That show, along with "Happy Days" and "All In The Family," placed three episodes on the list. "Maude" and a 1967 segment of "The Fugitive" were the only other series to make the special-dominated list. NBC's recent "Holocaust" presentation placed one of its four episodes in the Top 50, at 49.

MUSIC ON TV-Norman Lear's T.A.T. Communications has concluded a deal with Potclips Enterprises, a division of ex-Monkee Michael Nesmith's Pacific Arts Corp., for syndication of a daily half-hour series called "Popclips." The show will feature film clips of pop and rock tune performances, presently seen occasionally on American programs such as "Midnight Special" and a staple of foreign pop music TV programs. "Popclips" is set to debut this fall...Kies has begun shooting their first TV special, "Kiss Meets The Phantom," on NBC. Anthony Zerbe is the guest star...Andy Gibb is set for two upcoming TV appearances, a "Midnight Special" on June 9 and a guest spot on the May 26 "Osmond Brothers Special" on ABC... And KC & the Sunshine Band will appear on the "USO Tribute To Bob Hope's 75th Birthday" special May 29 on NBC, a three-hour program on which KC and band are the only pop-rock performers.

ABC, "Three's Company" Top Rating Week

ABC was the victor in the Nielsen ratings for the week ending May 7, the first week of the annual May sweep period. ABC earned an 18.4 rating compared to CBS' 17.3 and NBC's 15.5. "Three's Company" (a repeat showing) topped all competition, followed by 2) "MASH" (CBS) 3) "Laverne & Shirley" (ABC) 4) "One Day At A Time" (CBS) 5) "Happy Days" (ABC) 6) NBC's "Wheels" Part I (the top non-repeat show of the week and the only episode of the five-part special to be rated this week 7) "60 Minutes" (CBS) 8) "Charlie's Angels" (ABC) 9) "Love Boat" (ABC), and 10) "Lou Grant" (CBS) in a surprisingly strong placing. A repeat of "Elvis In Concert" on CBS, the documentary of one of the late star's last tours, finished 15th, while the Captain & Tennille's Hawaii special (ABC) was 33rd, Johnny Cash's special on CBS ranked 35th, and NBC's "Rock & Roll ,Sports Classic" finished 47th.

ABC had its usual triumphant week in Arbitron's New York/Los Angeles measurements, taking every place but number ten in L.A. and most of New York as well. "Laverne & Shirley" was New York's favorite of the week, followed by a three-way tie for second between CBS' "MASH" and ABC's "What's Happening" and "Three's Company." Following were 5) "Love Boat" 6) a four-way tie between ABC's "Barney Miller" and "Happy Days" and CBS' "Lou Grant" and "One Day At A Time", and at 10) a tie between ABC's "Carter Country" and its special presentation, "Phenomenon Of Benji," an interestingly high placement for the supposedly "sophisticated" New York audience.

In Los Angeles, "Three's Company" was on top, followed by 2) "Phenomenon Of Benji" (see previous comment) 3) a tie between "Charlie's Angels," "Happy Days," and "Laverne & Shirley" 6) "What's Happening" 7) "Carter Country" tied with "Fantasy Island" and "Love Boat," and 10) CRS' "Alice."

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

Rules On The Road

The number of recording stars who read *Radio & Records* never ceases to amaze me. We get notes from them sharing personal anecdotes, bon mots and ways to make the music business better.

It isn't easy to gain international stardom. The "Gary Owens" column has contacted a whole bunch of these wizened sophisticated sages, and we found that most of them say about the same things! I think it's my duty to pass their wisdom along!

NEVER book a room directly below Jose Greco and his Flamenco Dance Troup.

NEVER tell a local disc jockey he sounds like Truman Capote.



MCA Inc. Generates Record First Quarter Revenues; Record Division Up Slightly

MCA Inc. reported its highest ever first quarter revenues for 1978's in-itial three months, \$236.4 million (compared to \$197.9 million at the same time last year). Net earnings were up 33 percent, \$21.4 million compared to last year's \$16.1 million. The film and TV divisions led the way, with studio tour and Amphitheater revenues also up strongly. MCA Records and the company's music publishing operation enjoyed a 1 percent sales increase, up to \$24 million, while earnings were up 12 percent from about \$3 million a year ago to slightly above \$3.3 million this quarter.

George Lee Leaves MCA For New Music Co.

George Lee, MCA Records Vice President of Eastern Operations, has resigned that position to become President/Chief Executive Officer and part owner of a new music organization, MLO, a subsidiary of Martin Poll Productions. Lee will supervise acquisitions in the publishing and recording spheres establish an operating staff. MLO has already set up two publishing companies and acquired the exclusive composing services of Neil Sedaka for the next five years in a recently-announced deal.

Record Consumer Profile: WCI Survey Summarized

population sector seems to be buying more records. As WCI itself states in the brochure, "the prerecorded music industry has nothing to fear from the shifting demographics in the U.S. population. Assuming that buying patterns remain relatively stable, the years through 1985 should be years of increasing growth for the industry.

The 25 34 bloc is already respon able for more total record dollars than the 10-19 teenage group, 27 percent to 23 percent The 20 24 group, predicted for only 2 percent growth in the next eight years, is still the largest single record buying age bracket of all the five year groups, accounting for 22 percent of total dollar purchas es Meanwhile record buyers from 35 on up still lag behind, with no five year group in that category account ing for more than 6 percent of the total As it 1977 the percentage totals t r the 10.24 and 25.49 age groups were virtually equal (45 percent to 44 per ent). If the Census Bureau's population projections turn out as expect ed the older group should att in clear dominance by 1985

General Encouragement

As by knound information, the sur very posed a number of general ques tions. Respondents asked whether they telt recorded music was a good or bad value compared to other forms of home entertainment 71 percent felt music was a good value while only 9 percent called it bad (20 percent were neutral). As the survey brochure points out only 53 percent of respondents qualified as current buyers' (those who purchised i record or tape in the 12 menths proceeding their interviews) With 71 percent believing that records were a good value a sizable chunk of the total population may be easily sttrasted to becoming record con

83 percent of the population live in h. mes with record or tape players, the survey found 54 percent access to both record and tape playback equipment while 24 percent have record equipment only and 5 percent have only tape 73 percent of the population over ten years of age have bought at least one record or tape in their lifetimes an impressive figure but one which intuitively seems susceptible to substantial improvement (it would be interesting to compare to the figure for those who have seen a movie in a theater at least once, for in stance)

Measuring The Current Flow

Breaking down the current buyers (the 53 percent who bought records or tapes in the last year), 47 percent buy only records, 10 percent buy only tapes (8 tracks or cassettes), and 43 percent buy both Another statistical breakdown shows 43 percent of the total U S population bought at least one album last year, 19 percent bought a single (or more), 22 percent at least one 8-track, and 9 percent at least one cassette (prerecorded) Tape buyere, it was found, claim to be buying more tapes than they did a year ago, in dramatic numbers, but record buyere generally indicated they were buygroup) Still, a relationship between education level and record buying seems to exist.

Income And Outflow

Intuitive logic would indicate that people with higher family incomes would account for more than their share of record purchases, and so they

The "heavy half" concept familiar to marketing theorists (a specific percentage of buyers accounting for a disproportionately high percentage of total dollars spent for a product) is borne out in the survey Just 15 percent of the current buyers account for a full 50 percent of the total record tape dollar market, while 50 percent (the heavy half) buy about 85 percent In fact, a mere one-third (34 percent) of the current buyers are responsible for three-quarters (75 percent) of record purchases (in dollar volume).

Sex And Race And Education

The current buyers were profiled by race, sex, and education, with an exact correspondence in both sex and race among current buyers to the population at large Black males, it was found, compose 5 percent of the population and the current buyers, but account for 10 percent of the total dollar purchases, this phenomenon, however, was the only significant vanance. College-educated consumers make up 28 percent of the total population but represent 35 percent of the current buyers and account for 43 percent of the dollar volume (those figures include both graduate school-level con sumers and those with a partial college education). Those with a grade school education, on the other hand, make up 20 percent of the total population, but just 12 percent of the current buyers and a mere 7 percent of the dollar volume (those figures, however, include the surveyed 10-14 age

do, according to the survey, but not as dramatically as might be expected. Record-buying cuts across all income lines. Current buyers from families with incomes of under \$5000 account for 10 percent of total dollar purchases. although 18 percent of the popula tion is on that financial level. \$2,000plus consumers account for 20 per cent of the total dollar volume, although they represent just 15 percent of the population at large. One intriguing funding is that people in the \$20-25,000 area account for 7 percent of the total population, 10 percent of the current buyers, but only 7 percent of the total dollar volume, which might mean that relatively affluent group is not buying up to their commercial potential.

National Geographic Breakdown

Of seven national regions, only the Southeast and the Pacific recorded any significant differences between their share of the total population and their record buying habits. Southeasterners, representing 18 percent of the pop-

What's In Store

The survey also asked burrent buyers to denote their most-lavored buying place. Record stores were the favorites of 40 percent of the respondents, responsible for 46 percent of the total dollar purchases. Discount stores scored 21 percent for second place, followed by department stores (11 percent), record clubs (9 percent but 13 percent of total dollar volume), other retail (8 percent), and direct mail and TV offere bringing up the rear at 4 percent.

Radio And Records

The WCI survey presents solid con firmation of radio's role in selling rec ords. Current buyers were asked to report how many hours they listened to radio weekly on the average. While 24 percent of the population at large listens to the radio over 20 hours a week 30 percent of current buyers do so and account for a full 38 percent of records bought Similarly, while 19 percent of the population listens 11-20 hours weekly, 24 percent of current buyers purchasing 24 percent of the records are in that category Listeners who spend 1-5 hours a week with their ra dice make up 24 percent of the total population, but 22 percent of current buyers who account for only 17 per cent of the music bought. And those who listen less than an hour a week make up 14 percent of the population, but only 6 percent of the current buyers, who buy 6 percent of the records Obviously, a strong relationship between frequent radio listening and frequent record buying exists

Tape Casting

The survey indicates that "home tapers" (those who use their tape recorders to tape music off the radio or records) are not the parasites on the record industry many believe them to be First, of the 38 percent of the population with access to home tape recorders, only 55 percent of them say they use the recorders to tape music That adds up to 21 percent of the population in general, but tapers make up 32 percent of current buyers and are responsible for 38 percent of the total record purchases. Those without tape recorders (62 percent of the total population) account for 44 percent of total dollar purchases

Obviously, the material presented in WCI's survey brochure does not include all the relevant material gleaned by the company Detailed demographic data on specific buying habits and other leisure time behav ior, and in-depth profiles of various types of music buyers, leading to what WCI hopes will be a "new era of sophistication" in its marketing and advertising efforts, logically remain confi dential for company use exclusively But the data released provides what most would agree is a clearer glimpse at the preferences and general buying habits of active record buyers, and as such should prove of interest and of use to both the radio and record industries in their pursuit of more exact knowledge ·RH

FCC Q&A: Highpoints From R&R Convention '78

R&R presents the fourth in a series of transcriptions of the highlights from the FCC Q&A Session at R&R Convention '78. The FCC's Arthur Giasberg, and Larry Bernstein fielded questions from the radio industry in a candid and informative session, moderated by R&R FCC Advisor Jason Shrinsky,

Program Sponsorship

Q: A lot of stations now have "Midnight Album Specials." Let's assume that you sell an adjacency just before and/or after the playing of an entire album and the commercial says "The album is available at XYZ Records & Tapes." XYZ Records & Tapes has no choice in the selection of the album, they don't participate in the program in any way except that they buy an availability just before and/or after the program.

GINSBERG: This is a very complex and difficult question, but I would say the way you describe it you're going to wind up with 15 minutes of commercial time, because you've directly tied in the commercial to the album itself. The Commission has said that XYZ Record Company, or Columbia Records, or Arista Records or any of the other record companies might be able to buy 15 minutes or a half hour of time to play their albums, but if you interrelate the commercials to that, they cannot tie into that particular musical selection. In other words, what you have is known as a program-length commercial.

Q: Take it a step further and let's say that all the albums heard on the "Midnight Album Special" are available at XYZ Records.

SHRINSKY: If you're doing an open and close, I would say I don't feel you have a problem.

GINSBERG: If you do a show for an hour, and you do it once at the open and once at the close I don't think you have a problem. That's a discreet mention, but beyond that I think the Commission would be concerned that you're getting into making the entire program a commercial.

Q: Regarding payola...if you don't disclose that consideration was received to play a certain record, then you get into a payola problem. But if you do disclose, because of the juxtaposition of the announcement, is it a program-length commercial, which the Commission has stated isn't in the public interest?

BERNSTEIN: The question you ask is one of the most difficult legal questions I think we've had to face. If you do disclose you could have a program-length commercial situation, yes, but there are certain exceptions to that. For example, the Commission allows you to state at the beginning and the end of an hour "All of the records you just heard on this program are from Columbia Records." Obviously that does tie the two together, but the Commission would allow you a very, very brief exception. If you put it with a number of commercials and said "All these are Columbia's and why don't you buy the latest album," and tie the whole thing together, then you would have a problem.

SHRINSKY: That goes back to the prizes. All of you are giving away prizes. If you're getting into the T-shirts, and the albums and the belt buckles, you should be running your disclaimer at the end of the hour, and/or the top of the hour, merely advising the public that prizes have been given here in consideration for commercial credit. If you do that the public is not being deceived, and you don't have to have an announcement in every situation.

Application Processing

Q: What could be done to speed up the horribly slow processing of applications by the Commission? We have had an application for a change of CP.

SHRINSK Y: The problem right now is that there are two or three engineers, and the FCC decided that they were going to put a freeze on. What happened was that dozens of people rushed to file applications before that freeze deadline. So what they have now is a backlog on a backlog with the smallest number of engineers that they've had there in contemporary times. It is now taking a minimum of two years to process an application for a major CP. Until budgetary considerations are fulfilled, and the engineers are hired to do the work, there's going to be a problem. The minor applications are being processed with a great deal of expedition. Now the one engineer that was doing that has just been sent over to the major application side. So now it may only take a year or a year and a quarter to have a major application processed, but there is nobody at all processing minor applications. I rarely tell anyone to call your Congressman or Senator, but I suggest that you do that if you feel you have a problem.

Simulcasting

Q: Take a situation where a company owning an AM signal that doesn't have the power to cover the complete market area. That company buys a suburban FM outlet and simulcasts with the intention of covering the market. Aren't we really shortsighted in saying they can continue to simulcast 24 hours a day?

SHRINSKY: The more you encourage government intervention, the more government gets into everything, the more problems you're going to have. The reason that we have an AM-FM non-duplication rule is because some day-time only stations were very upset that people had full time facilities and as a consequence were not making proper use of it. They complained to the FCC. And the FCC said well maybe we should look into this business, maybe there isn't a proper utilization of the spectrum, so we're going to start cutting down on it.

Daytimers

Q: Can you explain to me the purpose of a 50,000 watt station? What purpose except for in times of emergency would you need a 50,000 watt station and why are there still daytime stations?

GINSBERG: There are still daytime stations because the Commission has a number of stations that fit in over the spectrum, they have to protect Mexican stations, they have to protect Canadian stations, and they can only fit so many stations into the AM spectrum at the present time. So in order to get a station at all for a local community, they can simply give it to you only for daytime, and sometimes they can give it to you only for daytime when it goes in a particular direction.

Q: Isn't that because it's competing, or it's in conflict with a 50,000 watt station that doesn't serve that community half of the time?

GINSBERG: The Commission, long ago, licensed a number of clear channel 50,000 watt stations and there has been some talk of possibly 100,000 watt super power stations, that can be heard everywhere in the country. But the Commission's basic ideology is based upon local service to your community. Now some of these 50,000 watt stations serve their local community but they also serve a whole statewide, sometimes multi-state community.

Q: I program the only black station in Boston, a daytimer. After we go off the air, the only other service to the black communities is through college radio.

GINSBERG: When you bought that station, you knew or the person who bought that license knew that all he could obtain without interfering with other signals was a daytime station. Now there's nothing to prevent your owner, if he's got enough money, from buying a full-time station, if there is one available.

Q: WBA1, is our conflict station in Baltimore, Maryland, It doesn't hardly get into Boston, it serves no purpose at all in that particular market.

SHRINSKY: You're dealing with an ideology. I suggest that when these Commissioners come to Boston, sit down and talk to them.

GINSBERG: Most people who own daytime stations take those stations knowing their restrictions. But invariably after they have that station for a few years, they look around and say "Boy it would be really nice to get on at nighttime." But there are no signal availabilities. The whole idea of the Commission was to create a number of signals, as many as they possibly could, without creating interference to each other. What's happened is you've got one going this way and you've got one going that way, and you cannot draw blood from a stone. There are no signal spaces available.

In a related incident. News Director of KLIF, Brad Messer also tendered his resignation and announced his plans to leave the Dallas station.


Both Van Dyke and Messer, when contacted by R&R, cited "philosophical and personal motivational differences with management" as reasons for their actions.

Rivers And Rivers To Phoenix

Very soon the Salt River will have competition in Phoenix and so will some thirty radio stations as two new Program Directors enter the market, both named Rivers. Steve Rivers has been named Program Director of KOPA and Bobby Rivers will become the new PD of KRUX. They are not related.

Steve Rivers, most recently the PD of WAPE/Jacksonville, FL., has been designated to head programming for First Media's newly purchased Phoenix properties KOPA and KOPA-FM. First Media also owns WPGC and WGPC-FM/Washington, DC. and Z-93/Atlanta, GA. The group recently purchased the two Phoenix properties and has already announced that the format of both stations will be Top 40. Charles Giddens will be the General Manager of KOPA.

Steve told me, "It'll be a totally new operation from the ground up. KOPA-FM is 50,000 watts and the AM is a 5000 watt daytimer at 1440 and offers excellent penetration in the market. It's going to be very interesting." The stations should debut their new format identities in early summer.

Meanwhile, KRUX's new Program Director is Bobby Rivers, from KTKT/Tucson, AR. Both KRUX and KTKT are owned by Lotus Communications, and both facilities are formatted Top 40.

The competition for radio listeners in Phoenix is just short of unbelievable considering the size of the market. Phoenix is ranked 29th in total population but is served by 31 different radio signals. As a point of comparison, Detroit, our nation's fifth largest market, is currently served by the exact number of stations as Phoenix, 31.

Bobby is very much aware of the competitive situation, "I was up in Denver for a long time and they have about as many signals as Phoenix. I am certainly looking forward to the challenge. And, of course, the chance to 'move up' within the same company is good. It's going to be a battle and we're just gonna 'rock and roll."

I have covered the Phoenix Top 40 format competition before, but new developments have surfaced. In addition to the two Rivers joining KOPA and KRUX, KUPD and KUPD-FM will be splitting their simulcast very soon. A change in the direction of the FM at KUPD is rumored, but the Top 40 emphasis is unlikely to change much. Additionally, the change in ownership (and format shift from Top 40 to religious) at KRIZ will not be taking place until September, so KRIZ will remain a Top 40 station through the Summer months. Needless to say, it will be a "rock and roll" summer for the Phoenix radio audience.

Christenson Promoted At KTSA

Scott Christenson has been promoted to the newly created position of Operations Manager of KTSA and KTFM/San Antonio, TX. The announcement was made by Waterman Broadcasting Executive Vice President Ken Dowe.

Scott has been with the San Antonio stations since October of 1977 and had been serving as Program Director of KTSA. Now Scott will be responsible for all programming matters for both KTSA and KTFM and will report directly to Mr. Dowe.

Scott told R&R, "I am most grateful to Mr. Dowe and President Bernie Waterman for this expression of confidence in me. I'm exceedingly enthusiastic about the prospect of further contributing to the success of two of America's finest stations." Christenson's promotion is effective immediately.

It was exactly 5:30PM Eastern Daylight Savings time and thanks to the magic of a long distance telephone line, I was listening to 99X-FM/New York. The connection was completed just in time for me to hear the final 20 seconds of "Baker Street" by Gerry Rafferty fading into the distance and then it happened!

A very serious voice (could it be Jack McCoy, no but...no it couldn't be) began, "99X-FM where tonight at midnight it's another radio first...The Official No-Bee Gees Weekend! Imagine, an entire weekend with no Bee Gees. No Bee Gees songs will be played, no Bee Gee albums will be given away. 48 Bee Gee-free hours. A break from the Bee Gees on the Official 99X-FM No Bee Gees Weekend, from the station that's making history in the city on FM, 99X. And we're not kidding...either."

Needless to say, the response came fast and furious as every single 99X request line lit up. Amazingly, most people were inquisitive but not outraged. If it does nothing else, the Bee Gee-Free Weekend will create a lot of talk about 99X. And when you consider that the Bee Gees have been in power rotation at most radio stations continuously since last Thanksgiving, maybe 99X's idea makes a lot more sense than you think.

One thing is for sure...New York knows that 99X-FM has a sense of humor and that is a rare radio ingredient that can set a station apart from its competitors.

"Forget Boardwalk And Park Place, I Want The RKO Chain"

It's called Superstation, The Original Game Of Radio and it's a board game for three to six players with certain similarities to Monopoly.

The game was created and defeloped over the last three years by Mark Rivers, Music Director of KOZA/Odessa, TX. Here's briefly how it works: the game board is divided into 42 radio station properties (major, medium and small markets). A roll of the dice determines the movement of your "small plastic transistor radio" game piece from space to space.

Located throughout the board are four "media brokers" from whom you may purchase radio stations. Each player may buy only one station per transaction and, of course, you may only acquire a total of seven properties. The roll of the dice can also move you to one of the "airshift" spaces at which time you must "go on the air." I'm told that this is a time-wasting penalty.

The ultimate winner is determined by accumulated rating points and as Mark explained, "You get different points for doing different things on the air. You might inherit a bad book and lose rating points. It's radio all the way, but the instructions are simplified so that nonradio people can easily play and enjoy it."

Mark currently has two working prototypes and is now ready to market his game to radio stations. The game has been designed in its layout to accommodate customization by any specific station. In other words the game could easily become "The WAAA Game of Radio." Mark also pointed out the promotional possibilities of his game, "Radio stations can utilize it for any type of promotion. For example, you could make a giant game board and organize a tournament in a local mall. You could award a dollar for each rating point the players accumulate. Have a contest on the air to qualify six players for the tournament. The large gameboard could be used with giant foam dice and perhaps some models dressed up as transistor radios to move around the board."

Superstation. The Original Game Of Radio, with big money stakes and ratings at the whim of the dice, could be great recreation for radio and non-radio people alike. you could challenge your General Manager (just to see who really is the most knowledgeable on radio), and it's the perfect gift for those who have always wanted to get into ownership! 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




